One for the books



What a night! On September 30, we went public with the Capital Campaign for our new community Arts Education Center. Campaign co-chair and hotel manager Phillip Murray pulled out all the stops and donated a fabulous reception at the Gettysburg Hotel for 200 enthusiastic Arts Council supporters who enjoyed food, drink, music, and speakers who reminded us what the arts are all about.

Motivational speaker Steven B. Wiley warmed up the room for his fatherin-law, Dr. Charles Glassick, former president of the Woodruff Arts Center and President Emeritus of Gettysburg College. Dr. Glassick inspired us with his reflections on a lifelong passion for the arts. Senator Richard Alloway characterized the Arts Education Center as an anchor facility that will help revitalize Gettysburg's Elm Street District and provide after school arts programs for at-risk students. Adams Electric Cooperative's Duane Kanagy talked

about his company's long association with the Arts Council and how the arts are good for business. Steve Niebler, director of the Adams County Office for Aging, explained how the center will serve senior citizens. Phil Murray and Arts Council president Holly Purdy unveiled our progress "thermometer" showing that we've raised \$621,111 toward our \$1.1 million goal.

We're so grateful to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Senator Alloway, the Margaret Trew Cline Foundation, the Thomas L. Cline Foundation, the Robert C. Hoffman Charitable Endowment Trust, and the Adams County Commissioners for major gifts and to the generous donors who have helped us reach this milestone.

I also announced that the Hoffman Trust had issued a challenge, a \$25,000 "dollar-fordollar" match when we raised that amount in new donations. I can't fully express my gratitude for what happened next: People lined up to make gifts and pledges totaling more than \$32,000!

We celebrated a remarkable achievement

that night. But we have a long way to go to reach \$1.1 million. We'll need the help of every Arts Council member to reach our goal. Recently you received a mailer asking for your support. Please respond with a gift that's meaningful to you. Without doubt, your gift will mean even more to the children and adults that we will serve in our new Arts Education Center.

Jörg plays guitar and sings; son Jonas plays trombone. At home in Germany, Jörg performs at clubs and festivals, and with the Saitenbaig Trio, specialists in guitar, accordion, fiddle, and vocal folk music. He is past chairman of the Landesarbeitsgemeinschaft Folk Schleswig-Holstein, an association for modern folk music based on traditional music, and does freelance work for Deutschlandradio Kultur, a German radio station dedicated to cultural matters.

Jörg also organizes the biennial Möllner Folksfest featuring folk and world music, and is a member of the Executive Committee of the federal state council of music for Schleswig-Holstein.

The Arts Council was delighted to work with Tom Jolin, the German Department of Foreign Affairs, and the Goethe Institute in coordinating and sponsoring the Geschkes' American tour, which enriched our lives with music.


